Sorry to hear of your experiences. Sadly your story is by no means unusual. it is hard to be sure why arach. is so 'hidden'. I think there are a number of explanations:

- 1. the medical profession regard it as a rare condition
- 2. they are reluctant to diagnose an iatrogenic (caused by medical procedures) condition

3.the condition is incurable so doctors feel it is a 'no hope' diagnosis

I was at a meeting just the other day, with a group of doctors: radiologist, neurosurgeon, pain doctors, chiropractor, physiotherapist etc. Arachnoiditis showed up in 2 out of the 10 or so cases we discussed. In one case, it hadn't been noted before, the neurosurgeon picked it ip but the radiologist was 'unconvinced' and admitted he only ever reports it if it is 'barn door' and unequivocal. This highlights the sort of problem we are dealing with.

You and others on the forum may be interested to know I am currently doing my Masters degree in pain management and as part of it am about to write a 20,000 word dissertation on recognition of adhesive arachnoiditis: aetiology (causes) and clinical presentation. In it I am including a case series with details on 10-15 cases. I am also going to be working with Kim Nevitt on a Cochrane Review of treatment of arachnoiditis. So I am always trying to raise the profile of the condition.
